



You can contest

If your application for a particular social benefit has been rejected, you must submit **a written appeal to the registry of the Agency for Payments and Social Inspection.**

Request a registration number. In the case of school/social scholarships, the appeal must be submitted to the school and to the County Center for Educational Resources and Assistance.

If the decision of the Child Protection Commission regarding the degree of disability is not in accordance with the specialist assessment or if the appropriate degree of disability has not been determined, the appeal must be submitted **within 30 days to the Administrative Court.**

The action is exempt from court fees.

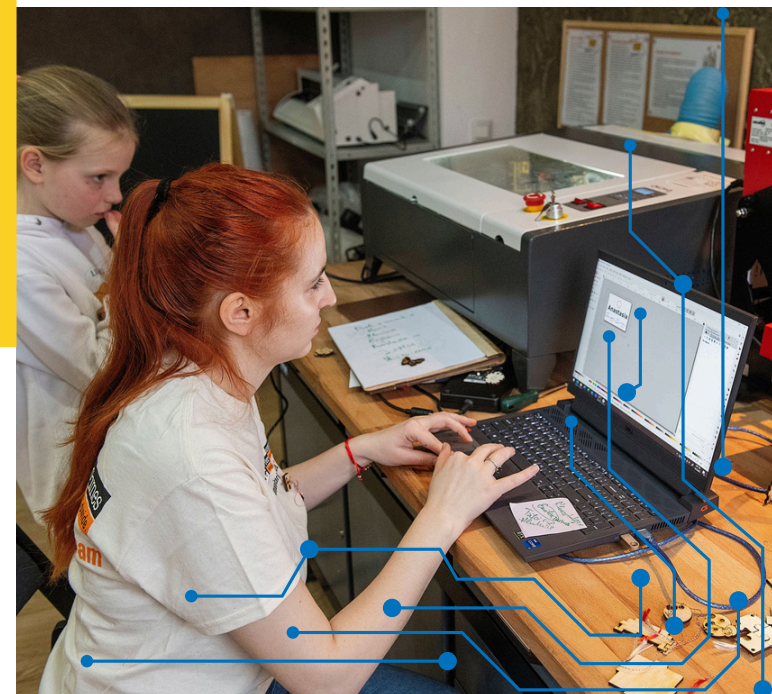

SOCIAL SERVICES



Social services in Romania are intended for children and/or families, people with disabilities, the elderly, victims of domestic violence, the homeless, people with various addictions, victims of human trafficking, the long-term unemployed, etc.

Romanian Government decision No. 96/2024 regulates measures of support and humanitarian aid for foreign citizens or stateless persons who find themselves in special situations and have arrived from the zone of armed conflict in Ukraine.



If you live on your own, you will receive a monthly lump sum for rent for **3 months**:

- **750 RON** – for one person
- **2.000 RON** – for a family



You can be accommodated in temporary camps with basic utilities and emergency medical assistance.



Child benefit – 292 lei/month (if you have a temporary residence permit with a registered address).



Minimum guaranteed income – assistance for vulnerable families.



Support for persons with disabilities (in accordance with Act No. 448/2006).



Childcare allowance – for Ukrainian parents who have had income in Romania (from salary, self-employment or copyright) for at least 12 months during the last two years prior to the birth of the child.



Medical care – access to state healthcare programmes, medicines, medical supplies and equipment free of charge, without paying contributions to the health insurance system and without additional fees.



You do not have to submit your application immediately; if you delay, the benefit will be provided for the following months.

Housing support upon arrival in Romania

Social benefits and medical services

After the 3 months, you will have access to:

Right to employment



You may work **without a special permit** for the entire duration of temporary protection.



If you do not have documents confirming your qualifications, you can work under a **declaration of personal responsibility** for unregulated activities.



There is also access to professional courses through **regional employment agencies**.

Education for children



Children have the right to **free school and pre-school education** in Romania.

If you have been granted temporary protection in Romania, the state provides you with social services and benefits so that you can live safely, take care of your family and integrate.

Support for vulnerable persons



Elderly people and people with reduced mobility can receive free social services (in accordance with Law No. 17/2000 on social assistance for elderly people).



The authorities may engage **social workers or cultural mediators**, including Ukrainians who speak Romanian, to facilitate integration.



Upon request, **children also benefit** from: boarding school accommodation (if necessary), daily meals, school supplies, clothing, and footwear.



If they do not speak Romanian, they can be enrolled as **auditors**. Minors enrolled as auditors can acquire student status in Romania after recognition or equivalence of their studies abroad and, if necessary, after taking difference exams, all of which are determined by the county school inspectorates.
